<u>Sports Premium Statement 2022/23 and</u> <u>Sports Premium Plan for 2023/2024</u>

What is the PE and sports premium for primary schools? Background:

The PE and sports premium for primary schools was introduced in March 2013 to improve the provision of PE and sport in primary schools across England. The school sport and activity action plan is a cross-government plan created to provide children with a greater chance to access 60 minutes of sport and physical activity every day.

This plan recommended that at least 30 of those minutes take place within school time. The PE and sport premium can help schools to achieve this aim, as it provides schools with £350 million of government funding to improve the PE and physical activity opportunities for children.

For the 2022/23 academic year Clee Hill Community Academy received £17100. This allocation was used to achieve a number of sustainable objectives:

I. To develop the leadership of PE to enable provision to become sustainable and high quality.

2. To develop and enhance the leaching of PE across the curriculum in all classes.

3. To offer an unusual sporting opportunity for children across school.

4. To further develop and enhance the opportunities for inter-school competition and competitive sport.

Sporting Achievements of 2022 - 2023

Swimming Gala — We took 24 KS2 children to the Primary Schools swimming gala in Ludlow. We had 3 children make their respective finals and we came 3rd in the Julie Link Memorial Canon Relay.



Tag Rugby - We took 3 teams to a tag rugby tournament at Lucton. 2 of our teams made it through to their respective finals with one facing off against Cleobury in the overall final. We were narrowly beaten 6-5, but to be in the top 2 out of 40 teams was a fantastic achievement.

Area Athletics - Clee Hill Community Academy came third overall at the Lacon Childe Primary School Area Athletics Tournament. Many pupils made their respective finals.

As a school we have carefully considered the best way to spend this funding in order to maximise and ensure the above sustainable objectives.



- Transport As a small rural school with limited facilities this is an essential part of our provision it has enabled us to increase participation and exposure to both competition and new sporting opportunities accessing high quality equipment and coaching.

3. Playground Games/Playhouses

- Jumping Jaxx programme is up and running with the both the year 5 and 6 children running this successfully.
- Playtime games shed (Shed Quarters) is running successfully with all children accessing games/toys leading to more active and happy playtimes.
- The playhouses have added more opportunities at break and lunch times that can be accessed in all weathers.
- Equipment The purchase of equipment supports our sustainability enabling us to continue to offer a
 wide range of activities on site and to ensure each child has access to the necessary equipment during PE
 sessions.
- 5. *Swimming* We believe at Clee Hill that this is an important life skill and with our rural location and the cost of swimming lessons outside school many children do not have access to the swimming pool. Therefore, every pupil from reception to year 6 attend at least five half hour sessions during the summer term.





