This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

At Clee Hill Community Academy, we teach our music lessons following the Charanga Musical School Scheme. This allows all teachers to deliver high quality, carefully planned music lessons, ensuring that all children progress and build upon their musical knowledge and skills throughout each year group. We encourage teachers to refer to the Charanga English Model Music Curriculum scheme, to enhance and inspire lessons as and when required. Music lessons are taught every week for one hour.

In addition to lessons, musical learning is further supplemented by weekly singing assemblies. Opportunities to sing within lessons are regularly provided.

Whole class instrumental lessons take place for Year 4 and 5 pupils. From September 2025, children in Year 4, 5 and 6 will learn to play the recorder as a whole class ensemble. This will be taught by the class teacher using the Charanga scheme.

Part B: Extra- curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

At Clee Hill Community Academy, children are offered a range of individual or small group instrumental lessons including guitar, piano, cello, violin and woodwind. Since April 2025, Music Squad Shropshire have been in school teaching 1:1 keyboard lessons and an after-school keyboard club on a weekly basis. These lessons are delivered by a peripatetic music teacher and paid for by parents. However, children eligible for Pupil Premium funding can be supported by this.

Our school choir is open to all pupils in school and meets once a week. Choir is led by our music coordinator, Mrs McKeon. In each session, children are given the opportunity to develop their vocal technique through warm up activities, as well as develop their overall musicianship through a range of repertoire of varying styles. We provide performance opportunities during assemblies and school events, which parents are invited to watch.

We have previously worked closely with Shropshire Music Service who continue to run a free ensemble called Stompers. All children from Clee Hill Community Academy who play an instrument are invited to attend. Sessions take place once a week on a Tuesday evening at Lacon Childe School. Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

At Clee Hill Community Academy, all children will have the opportunity to perform or experience a musical event. Please see below for a list of opportunities:

- All pupils from Nursery to Year 6 to perform at Christmas
- Assembly performances throughout the academic year (choir, instrumental ensemble, solo instrumental)
- Year 5 and 6 end of year leavers show

- Clee Hill's Got Talent all children are welcome to prepare an act to perform on stage. Special guests invited professional singers and musicians.
- Song of the Hill a lottery funded project where the children collaborated with composer – musician Sid Peacock to write lyrics for songs about our local area and history. This culminated in a performance of six brand new songs which they performed with a live band in St Laurence Church, Ludlow. As part of the project, the children often experience a visit to school from a musician to perform in assemblies.
- SGET Musical showcase KS2 children only
- Remembrance service held at Clee Hill village hall
- Reading miles children often watch or participate in musical activities originating from the chosen country

In the future

- Continue to monitor and ensure timetabled music lessons are delivered for one hour each week and that teachers are familiar with full resources from Charanga.
- Music coordinator to deliver CPD training and provide ongoing support to class teachers regarding the delivery of music lessons.
- Ensure staff are familiar with updated progression grid and the key knowledge for each class.
- Continue to work closely with Sid Peacock to ensure live music assemblies continue and possibly collaborate on a future project.
- Increase peripatetic music lessons orchestral instruments.
